
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Tennessee Council on Autism Spectrum Disorder

The new Tennessee Council on Autism Spectrum Disorder under the oversight of the Department of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (DIDD) seeks to establish a comprehensive statewide, long term plan for a system of care for individuals with autism spectrum disorder and their families. It has also been charged with making recommendations in program development for all levels of autism spectrum disorder services for both children and adults. The council is comprised of persons with autism spectrum disorder and families members appointed by Governor Haslam, as well as many relevant state agency representatives.

The Family Support (FS) Program is pleased to announce the addition of Rebecca "Becky" Black to the CDC Family Support Local Council. Becky is very familiar with FS, as her grandson Carl is a recipient of FS services. Becky is a life-long resident of Marshall County and a graduate of Chapel Hill High School. She is married to Ricky Black who works for the Marshall County Water Department. They have three grown children and nine grandchildren.

After graduating high school, Becky worked for local companies Teledyne and Faber Casteel, until injuries from a very serious automobile accident in 1991 kept her from continuing to work. Over the years to keep busy, Becky opened what she calls a "knick-knack shop" she tended to her roses and enjoyed taking care of her coy fish ponds, and was content. Then it all changed in 2009 when Carl was 3 and he was diagnosed with Leukemia. She said when she got the call she "closed the doors on her shop, packed everything up, and headed to Vanderbilt." She was at Vanderbilt with Carl for three weeks. He is now 12, and has been cancer free for five years, but Becky is still with him every day. She and her husband gained custody of Carl who has Down syndrome, shortly after his Leukemia diagnosis. Today her days are filled with being a full time volunteer at Carl's school where he is in the fourth grade. She says "they've been so good to him, so I can help them out when they need it." When not volunteering, she enjoys spending time with her other eight grandchildren and loves getting outside and working in her roses.



Adam, a student at the Children's Center for Autism, started the program with only two words and many problematic behaviors. His two words were *no* and *car*. He engaged in high intensity tantrums including aggression, screaming, and flopping. He has received services for a year and a half, and has shown great strides in his development. He now talks in complete sentences, can identify all his colors, numbers, letters, and shapes, and is completely toilet trained. His problematic behaviors have decreased to a manageable state and he is using more communication to get his needs met. In the next year, we will be working on Adam's learner readiness skills to ensure his success as he transitions to his kindergarten classroom. We are so proud of how hard he has worked and how great he is doing.

The fundraiser, which was held on Saturday, April 21st was a huge success!


